

RNCM Practice Development Guide to Board Certification

While board certification is not required for practice in RNCM roles, many nurses are interested in achieving board certification as a part of their professional practice development. Board certification is a quality indicator of demonstrating knowledge, experience, and competence in a specific area of nursing practice and specialty credentialing is awarded after successfully passing a national exam.

Certification exams are offered through nationally recognized certifying organizations with most requiring practice experience in the role as part of the eligibility criteria. Each organization outlines their eligibility criteria and testing details and most provide test preparation and study materials to support your success in passing their exam.

As you consider how board certification fits with your professional goals, consider the following:

- 1. What are my reasons for pursuing board certification? Answering this question for yourself will help you decide whether board certification is a match for your professional goals as board certification requires an investment of time and money.
- 2. **Does this certification reflect my RNCM practice?** There are many different types of certifications, and it is important for you to select an exam that matches your practice role and experience.
- 3. Is this exam focused on nurses or are other healthcare professionals also eligible to take the same exam? This is important to some nurses and organizations as they are interested in achieving a credential that is specific to nursing. For example, a healthcare organization working to achieve magnet status may prefer that RNCMs pursuing specialty credentialing do so through ANCC as the American Nurses Credentialing Center is the testing and certification arm of the American Nurses Association that supports Magnet status.
- 4. Will I be able to meet the criteria to renew my credential once I pass the exam? Typically, credentials are renewed every 3-5 years depending on the certifying organization. Renewal requires the completion of a designated number of continuing education hours or activities and payment of a renewal fee. Make sure you review the renewal requirements to ensure that this is something that you'll be able to accomplish.
- 5. Will I be able to use the National RNCM Certificate Program to meet Continuing Education requirements of a certifying organization? Yes. Graduates of the National RNCM Certificate Program earn 32 CE and are positioned to meet the CE eligibility requirements for specialty credentialing through ANCC, the American Nurses Credentialing Center. ANCC professional development activities can be recognized by other certifying organizations and there is usually a simple review process you can follow to receive approval. The National RNCM Certificate Program can also be used to meet CE requirements for credentialing renewal.
